1.1 Task 1: Understand the Differences Between Oracle Application Server 10g and Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g

Before you begin planning your upgrade to Oracle Fusion Middleware, you should be familiar with the differences between Oracle Application Server 10g and Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g.

1.2.1 What is an Upgrade Starting Point?

An upgrade starting point is a specific version of Oracle Application Server that you must be running in order to upgrade to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g. If you are not running a version of Oracle Application Server that is a supported upgrade starting point, then you must first upgrade to a supported starting point.

For example, if you are running Oracle Application Server 10g (9.0.4), then you must first upgrade to 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) before you can upgrade to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g.

1.2.2 Supported Upgrade Starting Points for Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g

You can upgrade to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g from the following previous versions of Oracle Application Server 10g:

- Oracle Application Server 10g Release 2 (10.1.2)
- Oracle Application Server 10g Release 3 (10.1.3)
- Oracle Application Server Portal Release 2 (10.1.4)
- Oracle Identity Management 10g (10.1.4)

You can also upgrade from standalone Oracle Web Cache 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) instances and from standalone Oracle HTTP Server 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) and 10g Release 3 (10.1.3) installations. Note: Before starting an upgrade, Oracle recommends that you upgrade to the latest patch set for your release. For example, if you are upgrading from 10g Release 2 (10.1.2), you should apply the latest 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) patch set before you begin the upgrade process.

1.2.3 Special Instructions for Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Release 1 (11.1.1.1.0) Users

If you installed and configured Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Release 1 (11.1.1.1.0), then you should be aware of the following:

- At the time this document was published, the latest release of Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g was 11g Release 1 (11.1.1.2.0), which provides new features and capabilities that supersede those available in Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Release 1 (11.1.1.1.0).
- This guide, as well as the other upgrade guides available in the Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g documentation library, provide instructions for upgrading from Oracle Application Server 10g to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Release 1 (11.1.1.2.0).

- For information about migrating from Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Release 1 (11.1.1.1.0) to 11g Release 1 (11.1.1.2.0), refer to *Oracle Fusion Middleware Using Patch Assistant to Migrate From 11.1.1.1 to 11.1.1.2*.

1.2.4 Using OracleMetaLink to Obtain the Latest Oracle Application Server Patch Set

1.2.5 What If I'm Not Running a Supported Upgrade Starting Point?

If you are running an Oracle Application Server release prior to the supported upgrade starting points, then you must first upgrade to a supported upgrade starting point. After you upgrade to a supported starting point, you can then use the Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g upgrade documentation to perform the upgrade.

Specifically, refer to [Table 1–1](#) for information on upgrading from earlier versions of Oracle Application Server to a supported starting point.

1.3 Task 3: Get Familiar With the Installation and Upgrade Tools

The procedures and tools you use to install and configure the Oracle Fusion Middleware components are very different from the ones you used to install and configure Oracle Application Server 10g.

1.4 Task 4: Develop a Backup Strategy for Upgrade

Before you begin upgrading your Oracle Application Server 10g environment, be sure you have backed up system-critical files.

Refer to [Chapter 5, "Backup Strategies for Upgrade"](#) for specific information on making sure all the various components of your environment can be restored in the event of a failed upgrade.

1.5 Task 5: Understand Your Compatibility and Interoperability Requirements

Before you begin upgrading your Oracle Application Server 10g environment, consider any compatibility and interoperability issues associated with upgrade.

Note that potential issues can be avoided by making sure you have applied the latest Oracle Application Server 10g patch sets, and that you have reviewed the list of recommended patches that are designed to help you avoid any problems during upgrade.

1.6 Task 6: Review the System Requirements for Upgrade

Before performing any installation you should read the system requirements and certification documentation to ensure that your environment meets the minimum installation requirements for the products you are installing.

2.1.1 Terminology and Concepts for 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) Users

Note: The 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) environment shown in [Figure 2–1](#) is simplified to show only an Oracle Portal instance and an Oracle BI Discoverer instance. In fact, a 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) environment can also include Oracle Reports and Oracle Forms Services, as well as an associated Oracle Application Server Identity Management installation.

Figure 2–1 Comparison of Terminology Used in 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) and 11g

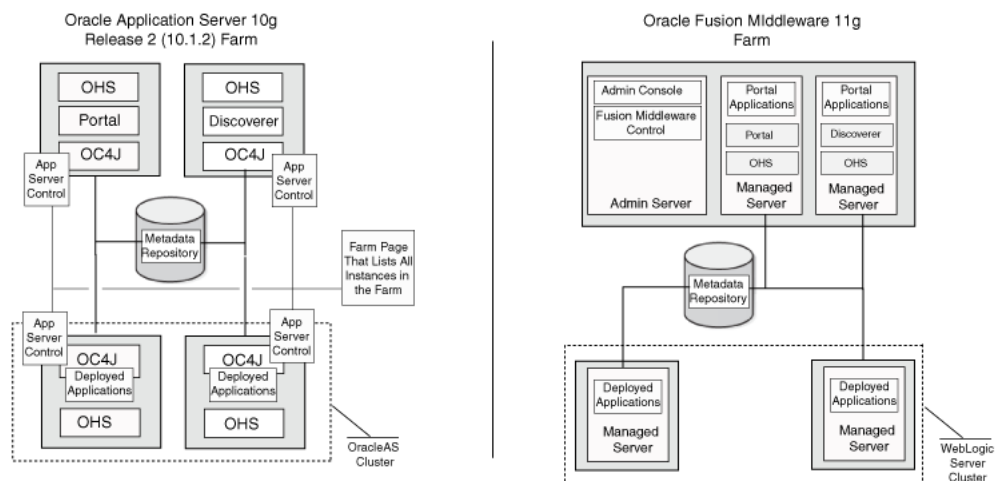

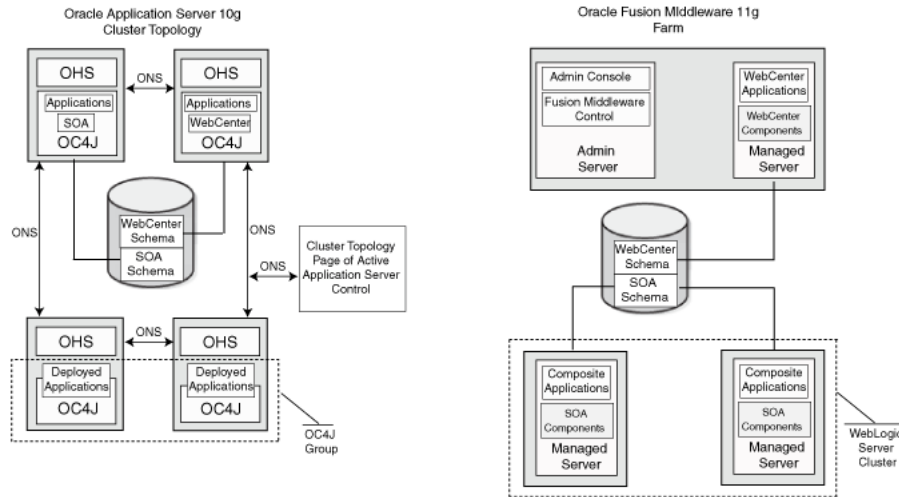

2.1.3 Oracle HTTP Server and Oracle Web Cache Concepts for 10g Users and 11g Users

2.1.3.1 Configuring Oracle HTTP Server and Oracle Web Cache in Oracle Application Server 10g

In Oracle Application Server 10g, Oracle HTTP Server and Oracle Web Cache were integrated with the rest of the Oracle Application Server middle-tier components automatically during the installation.

For example:

- In Oracle Application Server 10g Release 2 (10.1.2), you could select the Oracle HTTP Server and Oracle Web Cache components as part of a standard Oracle Application Server installation. During the installation and configuration of your environment, the routing of requests would automatically be configured between Oracle HTTP Server and Oracle Web Cache.

Components such as Oracle Single Sign-On and Oracle Portal require an Oracle HTTP Server, so in 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) installations, Oracle HTTP Server was automatically configured to communicate with those components.

- In Oracle Application Server 10g Release 3 (10.1.3), several of the common installation types included an instance of Oracle HTTP Server that was automatically configured to route requests to the OC4J instance.

Users could then later reconfigure Oracle HTTP Server to route requests to an OC4J group or to specific OC4J instances in a 10g Release 3 (10.1.3) cluster topology.

2.1.3.2 Configuring the Web Tier in Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g

In Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g, Oracle HTTP Server is still automatically installed and configured for specific components that require a Web server. For example, Oracle HTTP Server is automatically installed and configured with the following Oracle Fusion Middleware components:

- Oracle Identity Federation in the Oracle Identity Management software suite

- Oracle Portal and Oracle Business Intelligence Discoverer in the Oracle Portal, Forms, Reports and Discoverer suite

However, for the other Oracle Fusion Middleware suites, Oracle HTTP Server and Oracle Web Cache are packaged as a separate installation called the Web tier.

The assumption is that in production environments, many Oracle Fusion Middleware customers will configure a separate set of computers to host the Oracle HTTP Server and Oracle Web Cache components. Packaging these components as a separate Web tier installation facilitates setting up this type of environment.

2.2 Oracle Fusion Middleware Installation and Configuration Tools

Unlike Oracle Application Server 10g, the installation and configuration of your Oracle Fusion Middleware components is separated. In other words, you first use an installation program to install the necessary files on disk, and then you use a configuration wizard to configure the environment.

Because the Oracle Fusion Middleware system components are designed to work with Oracle WebLogic Server, the first step in configuring any Oracle Fusion Middleware environment is usually to install Oracle WebLogic Server. Second, you install the Oracle Fusion Middleware component software, and third, you configure the software. Each installation and configuration step is performed with a specialized tool.

As an example of the tools required to install and configure Oracle Fusion Middleware, consider the steps required to install and configure a typical Oracle SOA Suite.

In particular, to install and configure a production-ready Oracle SOA Suite environment, you use the installation and configuration tools that are shown in [Figure 2-3](#). The call outs in the figure correspond to the order in which you typically perform each installation and configuration task. Each step is described in more detail in [Table 2-3](#).

For more information about the tools available for installing and configuring an Oracle Fusion Middleware environment, refer to the *Oracle Fusion Middleware Installation Planning Guide*.

Figure 2-3 Installation and Configuration Tools Used to Install and Configure a Typical Oracle SOA Suite Environment

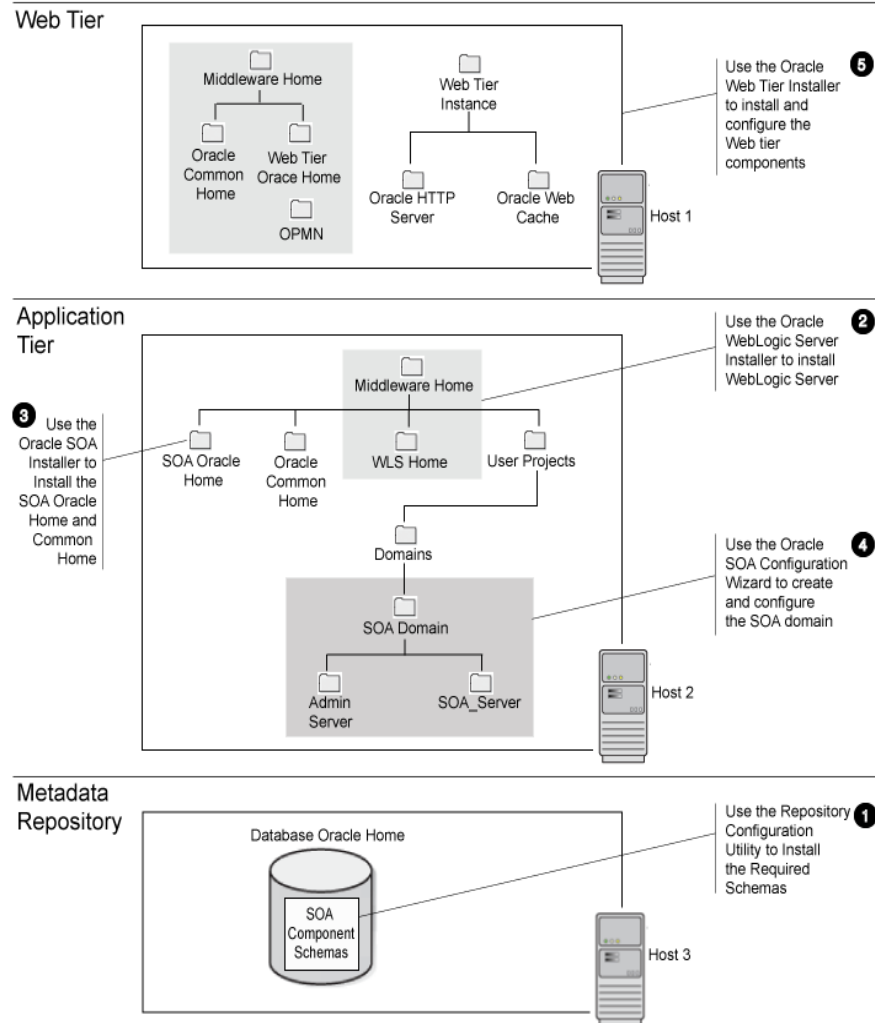

Planning an Enterprise Deployment Upgrade

This chapter provides an overview of the steps required to upgrade an Oracle Application Server 10g enterprise deployment.

3.1 What Is an Enterprise Deployment?

An enterprise deployment typically consists of more than just the application server middle tiers, which are used to deploy your applications.

Instead, an enterprise deployment typically consists of the following:

- The databases that support the application server and Identity Management components, as well as your deployed applications.
- One or more application server installations, which consists of the middle-tier system components and the applications you develop and deploy on the application server tier.
- Identity Management installations, which provides security and directory services for the Oracle Fusion Middleware components and the applications you deploy.

For more specific information about typical enterprise deployments supported by Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g, refer to the following documentation resources:

3.2 Recommended Procedure for Upgrading an Enterprise Deployment

The goal of an Oracle Fusion Middleware upgrade is to upgrade your entire enterprise to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g.

As you plan your enterprise upgrade, the following sections describe the broad steps you will need to consider:

3.2.1 Task 1: Upgrade the Databases Where Your Metadata Repositories Are Installed

Each release of Oracle Fusion Middleware has specific requirements for database features and capabilities. As a result, before you begin any upgrade, you should review the databases you are currently using and verify that they are supported by the Oracle Fusion Middleware software you are about to install.

For information on the supported database versions, as well as the guidelines and procedures for upgrading your databases, refer to [Chapter 6, "Upgrading and Preparing Your Databases"](#).

3.2.2 Task 2: Upgrade Your Application Server Installations

Upgrading the application server installations in your environment involves not only upgrading the application servers and the system components that comprise the middle tiers, but also upgrading:

- The metadata repositories that support the application server system components
- The custom applications you have deployed on the application servers
- The Web tier components (Oracle HTTP Server and Oracle Web Cache) that route requests to the middle tiers

Depending upon the types of applications you have, the order that you upgrade these elements of the application server installation will vary. For example:

- In an Oracle SOA Suite environment, you should install and configure your 11g environment first, and then upgrade your applications in Oracle JDeveloper. This allows you to set up your 11g data source and application server connections in Oracle JDeveloper before you upgrade the applications.
- In a Java EE environment, where you are not using Oracle SOA Suite, WebCenter, or Oracle ADF, you can upgrade the applications first. Then you can configure an environment with the resources and services required by each application after the applications are modified.
- In an Oracle Portal, Forms, Reports, and Discoverer environment, you must upgrade the Discoverer schema in the Metadata repository before upgrading the middle tier and upgrade the Portal schema after you upgrade middle tier.

3.2.3 Task 3: Upgrade Your Identity Management Components

Depending upon the Oracle Identity Management components you are using in your environment, the Oracle Identity Management upgrade involves upgrading one or more of these components:

- Oracle Internet Directory
- Oracle Directory Integration Platform
- Oracle Identity Federation
- Oracle Virtual Directory

The Oracle Identity Management components can be upgraded independently of the application server installations. In many cases, a single Oracle Identity Management environment can support multiple application server installations. As a result, you might choose to upgrade all of your middle tiers first and then upgrade your Oracle Identity Management environment.

For example, if you upgrade your Oracle SOA Suite 10g Release 3 (10.1.3) components to 11g, then you can continue to use your existing Oracle Identity Management 10g components until there is an opportunity to upgrade your centralized Oracle Identity Management environment.

3.3 System Availability During an Enterprise Deployment Upgrade

In general, you can upgrade your Oracle Identity Management and application server environments independently. In other words, you can keep your Oracle Identity Management components up and running while you upgrade your application server installations.

However, when you start the process of upgrading your application server installations, there are specific requirements for each type of middle tier that will determine whether or not you will have any downtime during the upgrade process.

For example, when you upgrade your Oracle SOA Suite middle tiers, you must also upgrade the metadata repository that contains the Oracle SOA Suite schemas and the custom Oracle SOA Suite applications you have developed and deployed on the Oracle SOA Suite middle tier.

4.3.1 Interoperability Between Oracle Fusion Middleware Software Suites

When you are upgrading your Oracle Application Server 10g environment to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g, you will likely update one area of your environment at a time.

For example, you might upgrade the middle tiers in one department to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g in order to support new Oracle SOA Suite features. At the same time, you might leave your company-wide Oracle Identity Management components at Oracle Application Server 10g.

For information about the interoperability between the Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g suites and the equivalent installation types available in Oracle Application Server 10g, see [Section 4.4, "Using the Oracle Fusion Middleware Upgrade Compatibility Matrix"](#).

4.3.2 Interoperability Within Oracle Fusion Middleware Software Suites

While you are upgrading your Oracle Application Server environment to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g, you should also consider potential interoperability issues within a specific software suite.

In most cases, these interoperability issues are temporary and occur only during the upgrade process. After you finish the complete procedure for upgrading the software suite, the issues are resolved. However, you should still be aware of these potential issues, because they can influence your upgrade planning.

[Table 4–1](#) lists some specific examples of some potential inter-suite interoperability issues that may affect your upgrade planning.

4.4.1 How to Use the Compatibility Matrix

The Oracle Fusion Middleware compatibility matrix can help you plan your upgrade to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g.

For example, if you want to upgrade a 10g (10.1.4) Identity Management instance to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g, then you can use the compatibility matrix as follows:

1. Locate the column in [Table 4-2](#) that represents Oracle Identity Management 11g.
2. Locate the row that represents the type and of Oracle homes you are currently running in Oracle Application Server 10g.

For example, if you are running Oracle Portal in a 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) Oracle home, locate the 11g **Portal, Forms, Reports, and Discoverer** row of the table.

The 11g **Identity Management** column of that row indicates that you should refer to the *Oracle Fusion Middleware Upgrade Guide for Oracle Portal, Forms, Reports, and Discoverer* for more information about using Oracle Portal with Oracle Identity Management 11g.

The Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g compatibility matrix is shown in [Table 4-2](#).

4.4.2 Understanding the Compatibility Matrix

When you use the compatibility matrix ([Table 4–2](#)), the level of support can be defined in one of the following ways:

- **Supported** - This means there are no known issues with using these two components together.

For example, your SOA, WebCenter, and ADF applications can be use Oracle Application Server 10g Identity Management components with no restrictions. Similarly, you can associate a new 11g SOA, WebCenter, or ADF environment with an existing 10g Identity Management installation.

- **Not Supported** - This means that Oracle does not support the interoperability between these two installations.

For example, if you upgrade your Web tier (Oracle HTTP Server or Oracle Web Cache), you must upgrade the Oracle Fusion Middleware component to which the Web tier is routing requests.

- **A reference to a specific Upgrade guide or section** - This reference is provided when the individual upgrade guide provides more detailed information about the compatibility requirements and issues that you should consider when upgrading to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g.

For example, refer to the *Oracle Fusion Middleware Upgrade Guide for Oracle Identity Management* for specific information about the interoperability of Oracle Application Server 10g Identity Management components with the Identity Management 11g components.

- **N/A - Not Applicable.**

For example, there is normally no communication or interactivity between custom Java EE Applications and Oracle Portal, Forms, Reports, and Discoverer installations.

4.4.3 About Oracle HTTP Server Interoperability During Upgrade

The following sections describe the upgrade-related interoperability capabilities and limitations of Oracle HTTP Server 10g and Oracle HTTP Server 11g:

4.4.3.1 Limited Support for Oracle HTTP Server 10g with Oracle WebLogic Server

Two different versions of Oracle HTTP Server were available with the Oracle Application Server 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) and 10g Release 3 (10.1.3):

- The integrated Oracle HTTP Server, which was installed and configured automatically with the 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) and 10g Release 3 (10.1.3) components by Oracle Universal Installer. This integrated version of the Oracle HTTP Server was based on Apache 1.3.
- The standalone, separately-installed Oracle HTTP Server, which was available on the 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) and 10g Release 3 (10.1.3) Companion CD-ROM. This standalone version of Oracle HTTP Server was based on Apache 2.0.

The interoperability capabilities and restrictions for the integrated Oracle HTTP Server and the standalone Oracle HTTP Server are different:

- The integrated Oracle HTTP Server for 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) and 10g Release 3 (10.1.3) is based on Apache 1.3 and currently is not certified for use with Oracle WebLogic Server for Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g.

As a result, you cannot configure the integrated Oracle HTTP Server to route requests to Oracle WebLogic Server 11g.

- The standalone Oracle HTTP Server is based on Apache 2.0, which is certified with Oracle WebLogic Server 11g.

As a result, you can configure the standalone Oracle HTTP Server to route requests to Oracle WebLogic Server by following the same instructions as you would for Apache 2.0.

For more information, see *Oracle Fusion Middleware Using Web Server Plug-Ins with Oracle WebLogic Server*.

4.4.3.2 No Support for Oracle HTTP Server 11g with OC4J 10g

Oracle HTTP Server 11g is not supported with OC4J 10g. This is because the required `mod_oc4j` module is not compatible with Oracle HTTP Server 11g.

As a result, do not upgrade your Oracle HTTP Server instances to 11g until after you have upgraded your OC4J 10g instances to 11g.

4.4.4 About Oracle Identity Management Interoperability During Upgrade

Some of the components in Oracle Application Server 10g Release 2 (10.1.2) depend upon specific Oracle Identity Management 10g components. As a result, you should consider the following when you upgrade Oracle Identity Management or Oracle Portal, Forms, Reports, and Discoverer to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g:

- If you upgrade the Oracle Portal, Forms, Reports, and Discoverer middle-tier components to 11g before the you upgrade the associated Oracle Identity Management components, then there are no known interoperability restrictions.
- If you upgrade the Oracle Identity Management components to 11g before you upgrade the Oracle Portal, Forms, Reports, and Discoverer components, then the only restriction to consider is when the Oracle Identity Management 10g components are in a colocated Oracle home.

A colocated Oracle Identity Management 10g Oracle home contains all four of the primary Oracle Identity Management 10g components (Oracle Internet Directory, Oracle Directory Integration Platform, Oracle Single Sign-On, and Oracle Delegated Administration Services). However, you can upgrade only Oracle Internet Directory and Oracle Directory Integration Platform to 11g.

As a result, after you upgrade Oracle Internet Directory and Oracle Directory Integration Platform to a new 11g Oracle instance, you must then decommission the Oracle Internet Directory and Oracle Directory Integration Platform instances in the 10g Oracle home.

For complete information about the required post-upgrade tasks for Oracle Internet Directory and Oracle Directory Integration Platform, see "Upgrading Your Oracle Internet Directory Environment" in the *Oracle Fusion Middleware Upgrade Guide for Oracle Identity Management*.

4.5 Applying Patch Sets to Address Specific Upgrade Interoperability Issues

In general, Oracle assumes that you are running the latest Oracle Application Server 10g patch sets before you begin the upgrade to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g.

In addition, in some specific cases, you must apply an additional software patches to your Oracle Application Server 10g components before you start the upgrade process. These patches are designed to address specific interoperability issues that you might encounter while upgrading your Oracle Application Server 10g environment to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g.

For example:

- Before you export your Oracle B2B data in preparation for upgrading the Oracle B2B schema from 10g to 11g, you must apply a patch to the Oracle B2B environment.
- Before you upgrade your Oracle Business Activity Monitoring schema to 11g, you must apply a patch to the database that contains the Oracle BAM 10g schemas.
- Before your Oracle BPEL Process Manager client applications that are still running in an Oracle Application Server 10g environment can invoke Oracle BPEL Process

Manager 11g processes, you must apply a patch set to the Oracle Application Server 10g Oracle home.

Backup Strategies for Upgrade

Before you start the upgrade process, you should have a clear understanding of the backup requirements. These requirements vary somewhat, depending upon whether you are upgrading a middle tier, an MDS Repository, or Oracle Identity Management Oracle home.

5.1 Backup Strategies for Middle Tier Upgrades

When you upgrade a middle tier installation, you install the Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) Oracle Application Server Suite, Oracle SOA Suite, or Oracle WebCenter Suite into a new Oracle home directory and then use the Oracle Fusion Middleware Upgrade Assistant to copy your configuration data from the original Oracle Application Server 10g source Oracle home to the new Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g directories.

The upgrade process alters only the 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) destination directories; the source Oracle home is always left unchanged. As a result, there is no need to implement additional or new backup strategies for the source Oracle home, other than those you already use to protect your application server data.

On the other hand, you may want to create a backup of the new 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) destination middle-tier environment before you run the Upgrade Assistant. This backup will allow you to restore to a pre-upgrade (that is, newly installed) state. Restoring from backups is an efficient alternative to reinstalling the entire instance, in the event that upgrade results are unsatisfactory.

A useful 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) backup would include both the Oracle home and any Oracle instances created during or after the 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) installation. You can use the Oracle Fusion Middleware Backup and Recovery software to perform this backup.

5.2 Backup Strategies for Metadata Repository Upgrades

In most cases, when you upgrade the metadata repository, you must first upgrade the database that hosts the repository to a database version supported by Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Release 1 (11.1.1).

5.2.1 Backing Up the Database Before Upgrading the Database Version

As with any database upgrade, standard procedure dictates that you back up your database before you upgrade to a new database version.

Note that you should also consider backing up the database again, after you have successfully upgraded to a new database version. This way, your backup will reflect the newly upgraded state of the database.

For more information, see the Oracle Database documentation for your platform and database version.

5.2.2 Backing Up the Database Before Upgrading the Schemas in the OracleAS Metadata Repository

Depending upon the Oracle Application Server components you are upgrading, you should be sure to perform a backup of the database before upgrading the component schemas stored in the database.

For some components, the schema upgrade is performed "in-place," which means that the Upgrade Assistant alters the component schemas that exist in the database. It does not create a new copy of the schemas or the data they contain. In an "in-place" upgrade, the schema changes made by the Upgrade Assistant are irreversible.

For example, the Oracle Portal schema upgrade and the Oracle Internet Directory schema upgrade are in-place upgrades. The Oracle BI Discoverer, Oracle BAM, and Oracle B2B schemas are not.

Before you run the Upgrade Assistant to perform an "in-place" upgrade of the component schemas in the database, you should perform a backup of the database that contains the schemas. This backup will allow you to restore your database to its original state if necessary.

5.2.3 Locating the Oracle Database Backup Documentation

The Oracle database documentation library contains extensive information about database backup features, strategies, and procedures. Refer the documentation library for your database version for more information.

For example:

- If you are using Oracle Database 10g Release 2 (10.2), then see the *Oracle Database Backup and Recovery Quick Start Guide* in the Oracle Database 10g Release 2 (10.2) documentation library.

- If you are using Oracle Database 11g, then see the *Oracle Database Backup and Recovery User's Guide* in the Oracle Database 11g documentation library.

5.3 Backup Strategies for Identity Management Upgrades

When you upgrade an Oracle Identity Management installation, you install the Oracle Identity and Access Management Suite into new Oracle home and Oracle instance directories. You then use the Oracle Fusion Middleware Upgrade Assistant to perform two distinct tasks:

1. Copy your configuration data from the Oracle Identity Management source Oracle home to the new 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) Oracle Identity Management destination directories.
2. Upgrade the Oracle Identity Management schemas in the MDS Repository

5.3.1 Backup Strategies for the Oracle Identity Management Middle Tier

During the first part of the upgrade process, the Upgrade Assistant alters only the 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) directories; the source Oracle Identity Management Oracle home is left unchanged. As a result, there is no need to implement additional or new backup strategies for the source Oracle home, other than those you already use to protect your application server data.

5.3.2 Backup Strategies for the Oracle Identity Management Schemas

During the second part of the upgrade process, the Upgrade Assistant upgrades the Oracle Identity Management schemas to 11g Release 1 (11.1.1). This upgrade of the schemas is performed "in place," which means that the Upgrade Assistant alters the Oracle Identity Management schemas that exist in the database. It does not create a new copy of the schemas or the data they contain. The schema changes made by the Upgrade Assistant are irreversible.

As a result, before you run the Upgrade Assistant to upgrade the schemas in the OracleAS Metadata Repository, you should perform a backup of the database that contains the schemas. This backup will allow you to restore your database to its original state before you ran the Upgrade Assistant.

5.3.3 Additional Backup Strategies When Upgrading Oracle Identity Management

Immediately after you complete the installation of the Oracle Identity and Access Management Suite, and before you run the Oracle Fusion Middleware Upgrade Assistant, you may want to create a backup of the newly installed 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) destination middle-tier environment. This backup will allow you to restore to a pre-upgrade (that is, newly installed) state. Restoring from backups is an efficient alternative to reinstalling the entire instance, in the event that upgrade results are unsatisfactory.

A useful 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) backup would include both the Oracle home and any Oracle instances created during or after the 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) installation. You can use the Oracle Fusion Middleware Backup and Recovery software to perform this backup.

5.4 Backup Strategies After Upgrading Your Oracle Application Server Instances

After you have completed and verified the upgrade of your Oracle Fusion Middleware environment, consider backing up your Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) installations so you can easily restore your environment to the newly upgraded state.

In particular, consider backing up the database that hosts your upgraded Oracle Fusion Middleware schemas immediately after the upgrade process. After this initial post-upgrade backup, you can begin your regularly scheduled database backup routine. The initial backup after the upgrade will ensure that you can restore your environment to the newly upgraded 11g Release 1 (11.1.1) state without repeating the upgrade process.

In addition, after you have moved your development or deployment activities to the newly upgraded Oracle Fusion Middleware installations, be sure to modify your regular backup routine to include the new Oracle Fusion Middleware directories, including the Oracle Fusion Middleware Oracle home directories and Oracle instance directories.

- Oracle Database 11g Release 1 (11.1.0.7)
- Oracle Database 11g Release 2 (11.2.0.1.0)

6.1.2 Obtaining the Latest Oracle Application Server Database Requirements

The Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g software requirements included in this guide were accurate at the time this manual was published.

For links to the most up-to-date information about software requirements, including the database versions required for Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g, refer to "System

6.2 Task 2: Determine Your Current Database Version

To determine the version of your Oracle database, query the `PRODUCT_COMPONENT_VERSION` view, as follows:

```
prompt> sqlplus "sys/password as sysdba"
SQL> SELECT version FROM v$instance;
```

In this example, replace *password* with the password for the SYS database user.

6.3.1 Installing the Oracle Text Database Option (Required for Oracle Portal)

When you upgrade your database to a supported version for Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g, note that if you are using Oracle Portal, then you must be sure that the Oracle Text database option is installed and configured as part of the database upgrade process.

Specifically:

- If you are upgrading to Oracle Database 10g Release 2 (10.2.0.4), then you must install the Oracle Text option from the Oracle Database Companion CD-ROM after you install 10g Release 2 (10.2.0.1) and before you apply the Oracle Database 10g Release 2 (10.2.0.4) patch set.

For more information, refer to the Oracle Database 10g installation documentation.

- If you are upgrading to Oracle Database 11g (11.1.0.7), then you must install Oracle Text from the Oracle Database Example CD-ROM after you install Oracle Database 11g (11.1.0.1) and before you apply the Oracle Database 11g (11.1.0.7) patch set.

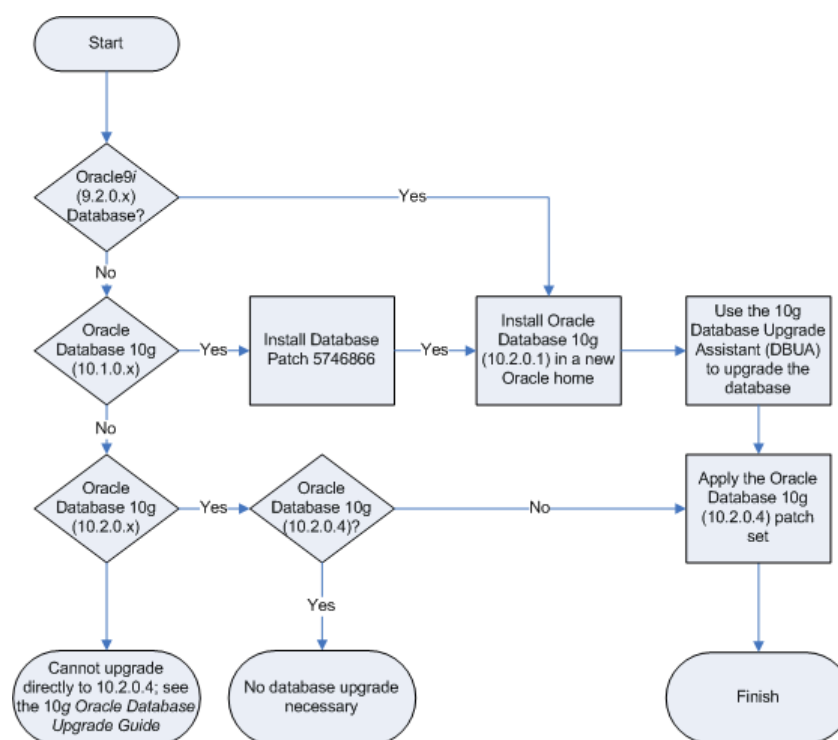

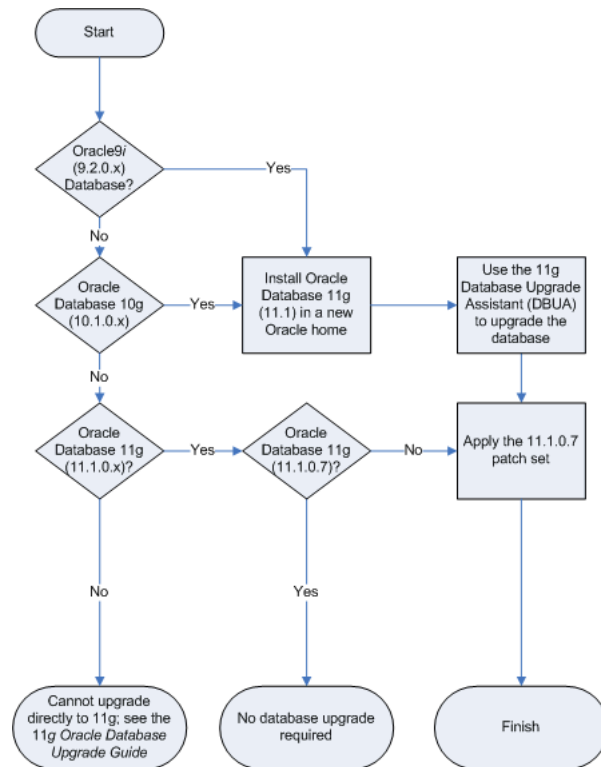

6.3.4.1 Determining Whether Your Database is a Seed Database or OracleAS RepCA Database

As you begin the upgrade process, it is important to know how your OracleAS Metadata Repository was installed into your database. Specifically, consider the following to determine the type of OracleAS Metadata Repository database you are upgrading. Each type of OracleAS Metadata Repository database is upgraded differently:

- If you used the Oracle Application Server installation procedure to create a new database for the OracleAS Metadata Repository, refer to the information in this section for information about upgrading the seed database to one supported by Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g.

This type of database is referred to as a seed database, because the database was created automatically by the Oracle Application Server installation procedure specifically for hosting the OracleAS Metadata Repository.

If you created the seed database with 10g Release 2 (10.1.2), then the database is likely an Oracle Database 10g (10.1.0.4) database. If you created the database with 10g (10.1.4), then the database is likely an Oracle Database 10g (10.1.0.5) database.

- If you used OracleAS Metadata Repository Creation Utility to install the OracleAS Metadata Repository in an existing database, you must upgrade the database using the standard database upgrade instructions. For more information, see [Section 6.3.2, "General Information About Upgrading to Oracle Database 10g Release 2 \(10.2.0.4\)"](#) or [Section 6.3.3, "General Information About Upgrading to Oracle Database 11g"](#).

This type of OracleAS Metadata Repository database is referred to as an OracleAS RepCA database, because you used OracleAS RepCA to install the repository in an existing database that you installed and configured yourself.

6.3.4.2 About Upgrading a 10g Seed Database to Oracle Database 10g Release 2 (10.2.0.4)

When you upgrade your Oracle Application Server 10g seed database to Oracle Database 10g Release 2 (10.2.0.4), refer to the following documentation resources for more information:

6.4 Task 4: Check for Invalid Objects in the Upgraded Database

Before you upgrade the schemas in your database, it is good practice to check to make sure that none of the database objects required by Oracle Fusion Middleware are invalid:

1. Connect to the OracleAS Metadata Repository database.
For example:

```
ORACLE_HOME/bin/sqlplus "connect / as sysdba"
```
2. When prompted, enter the SYS password.
3. Issue the following SQL command:

```
SELECT owner, object_type, object_name
FROM all_objects
WHERE status='INVALID';
```

The query should not return any database objects that have an Oracle Application Server component schema (such as PORTAL, WIRELESS, and so on) in the 'owner' column.

If you find any invalid objects, run the `utlrbp.sql` script from the SQL*Plus command line to recompile the invalid objects:

```
@?/rdbsms/admin/utlrbp.sql
```

For more information about invalid objects, see "About Dependencies Among Schema Objects" in the *Oracle Database Administrator's Guide*.

6.5 Task 5: Relocate the Database Datafiles, Control Files, and Log Files

By default, after you upgrade your database, the datafiles, control files, and log files associated with the database remain in their original location. For example, if you previously used Oracle Application Server 10g installer to upgrade a Metadata Repository seed database, the datafiles for the Metadata Repository database remain in the source Oracle home.

As a result, Oracle recommends that if you have not done so already, you relocate these files as a safeguard against inadvertently deleting them (for example, by deleting or decommissioning the entire source Oracle home directory tree). In addition, there may be performance benefits to moving the database files outside of the source Oracle home.

This chapter describes how to run the Oracle Fusion Middleware Upgrade Assistant from the command-line interface.

By default, the upgrade documentation describes how to use the graphical user interface to upgrade your Oracle Application Server 10g components to Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g. However, you can use the command-line interface, documented in this appendix, to automate the upgrade process with operating system scripts or to run the Upgrade Assistant remotely in a terminal window.

A.1 Invoking the Graphical User Interface

The following arguments can be used when you launch the Upgrade Assistant graphical user interface:

On Windows systems:

```
ORACLE_HOME\bin\ua.bat  
[-logLevel log_level]
```

On UNIX systems:

```
ORACLE_HOME/bin/ua  
[-logLevel log_level]  
[-invPtrLoc inventory_location]
```

For more information, see Section B.7, "Starting the Upgrade Assistant on UNIX Systems When Using Multiple Oracle Universal Installer Inventory Locations".

- On UNIX systems:

To use the Upgrade Assistant command line to upgrade a middle tier, enter the following command at the operating system prompt.

For example, you can use the arguments described here to upgrade an Oracle Portal, Forms, Reports, and Discoverer middle tier or a Web tier middle tier:

- On Windows systems:

```
ORACLE_HOME\bin\ua.bat MT
-sourceHome SOURCE_ORACLE_HOME
-destInstanceHome ORACLE_INSTANCE
[-logLevel log_level]
[-[no]verbose]
[-[no]silent]
[-[no]retainPorts]
[-[no]stopComponents]
[-[no]startComponents]
[-wlsHost wls_host]
[-wlsPort wls_port]
[-wlsUserName wls_user]
```
- On UNIX systems:

```

ORACLE_HOME/bin/ua MT
-sourceHome SOURCE_ORACLE_HOME
-destInstanceHome ORACLE_INSTANCE
[-logLevel log_level]
[-[no]verbose]
[-[no]silent]
[-[no]retainPorts]
[-[no]stopComponents]
[-[no]startComponents]
[-wlsHost wls_host]
[-wlsPort wls_port]
[-wlsUserName wls_user]
[-invPtrLoc inventory_location]

```

Note: The wls (Oracle WebLogic Server) options are not supported when you are running the Upgrade Assistant from a Web Tier Oracle home.

Argument	Description
-sourcehome SOURCE_ORACLE_HOME	Replace SOURCE_ORACLE_HOME with the full path to the Oracle Application Server 10g Oracle home that you want to upgrade. This is a required argument for middle-tier upgrades.
-destInstanceHome ORACLE_INSTANCE	Replace ORACLE_INSTANCE with the full path to the newly installed Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Oracle instance. This is a required argument for middle-tier upgrades.
-logLevel log_level	Replace log_level with one of the following values: ■ NOTIFICATION ■ WARNING ■ ERROR ■ INCIDENT_ERROR ■ TRACE The default setting if you do not provide this argument is NOTIFICATION.
[-no]verbose	Use this argument to output detailed information to the screen when you are running the Upgrade Assistant in command-line mode. Use -noverbose to limit the amount of detail displayed on the screen. The default setting if you do not include this argument is -noverbose.
[-no]silent	Use this argument to turn off prompts and user confirmations during the upgrade. The default setting if you do not specify this argument is -nosilent. The Upgrade Assistant will prompt only for passwords.

Table A–2 (Cont.) Summary of the Upgrade Assistant Command-Line Arguments When Upgrading a Middle Tier

Argument	Description
-[no]retainPorts	Select this option to retain the port numbers used by the source middle tiers. The default setting is <code>-retainPorts</code>. Note: Be sure to refer to "Important Notes When Using the Source Oracle Home Ports in the Destination Oracle Instance" in <i>Oracle Fusion Middleware Upgrade Guide for Oracle Portal, Forms, Reports, and Discoverer</i>.
-[no]stopComponents	Use this argument to stop all the components in the Source Oracle home before the upgrade process begins. The default setting is <code>-stopComponents</code>. Stopping the source components is necessary to avoid any port conflicts when you select the Use source Oracle home ports in destination option in the GUI or the <code>-retainPorts</code> command-line argument.
-[no]startComponents	If you select this option, then Upgrade Assistant will attempt to start the 11g Oracle instance immediately after the upgrade. To start the components manually after the upgrade, use the <code>-nostartComponents</code> argument. The default setting is <code>-startComponents</code>.
wls_host <i>wls_host</i> wls_port <i>wls_port</i> wls_user <i>wls_user</i>	Use these arguments to provide the host, port, and user name of the Administration Server in the destination Oracle WebLogic Server domain. For example, the port and user name are usually 7001 and <code>weblogic</code>, respectively. These settings default to the values associated with the specified Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Oracle instance. Note that these arguments are not required or supported when you are upgrading a Web tier Oracle home.

ORACLE_HOME\bin\ua.bat B2B
-targetURL target_database_connect_string
-targetUserName target_database_user
-[no]ErrorMode
-[no]CheckMode
-[no]UpgradeMode
```

- On UNIX systems:

```
ORACLE_HOME/bin/ua B2B
-targetURL target_database_connect_string
-targetUserName target_database_user
-[no]ErrorMode
-[no]CheckMode
-[no]UpgradeMode
```

B.1 General Troubleshooting Guidelines

If errors occur while you are running the Upgrade Assistant, use the following steps to troubleshoot the problem:

1. Locate and open the Upgrade Assistant log file with a text editor:
For the location of the log file, see [Section B.3, "Examining the Log File"](#).
2. Locate any error messages that are identified by number; for example, UPGAST-00091.
3. Look up the error in the *Oracle Fusion Middleware Error Messages Reference*.
The description of the error in the *Oracle Fusion Middleware Error Messages Reference* should include a description of the cause of the error, as well as the action you should take to resolve the error.
4. Based on whether or not you can locate an error message and the error message description, do the following:
 - If, by reviewing the log files and the *Oracle Fusion Middleware Error Messages Reference*, you are able to identify a solution to the upgrade failure, you can implement your solution and then re-start the Upgrade Assistant and perform the upgrade again.

When you re-run the Upgrade Assistant, any components that were upgraded successfully during the previous run will not be affected. However, the Upgrade Assistant will attempt to upgrade any components that were not upgraded successfully during a previous run of the utility.

- Contact Oracle Support for any errors that are not documented or that cannot be resolved by following documented actions. Note that some errors that occur will require the repository to be restored from backup, the problem to be resolved, and another upgrade to be run.

B.2 Resolving Common Upgrade Assistant Errors

If errors occur while you are running the Upgrade Assistant, you must correct the conditions that caused them before you try the upgrade again. The following sections provide some guidance in resolving Upgrade Assistant errors:

B.2.1 Source Oracle Home Not Listed by Upgrade Assistant

If the source Oracle home does not appear as expected in the drop-down list on the Oracle Homes, suspect one of these conditions: wrong installation type, Oracle homes are on different computers, or the Oracle home is not identified in the inventory of Oracle products. The solution for each of these is detailed below.

Wrong Installation Type The source Oracle home will not appear if the installation type of the source middle tier is not compatible with the installation type of the destination middle tier instance.

Oracle Homes on Different Computers Another case in which the source middle tier will not appear as a selection is that the source middle tier instance is installed on a different computer from the destination middle tier instance. If this is the case, you must install the destination middle tier instance on the same computer as the source instance to be upgraded.

Oracle Home Not Identified in the Oracle Inventory The Upgrade Assistant locates Oracle Application Server Oracle homes on your system by analyzing the contents of the Oracle inventory.

Every time you install an Oracle software product on a host computer, Oracle Universal Installer saves information about the software installation on your hard disk. The directories and files that contain this software configuration information are referred to as the Oracle Universal Installer inventory.

In some cases, a particular installation may not appear in the inventory. It could be that the inventory directory was deleted or damaged, or it could be that multiple inventories are installed on the computer. On UNIX systems, you can resolve this issue by referring to [Section B.7, "Starting the Upgrade Assistant on UNIX Systems When Using Multiple Oracle Universal Installer Inventory Locations"](#).

B.2.2 Error Message States that No Components Can Be Upgraded

This error can appear when you are attempting to upgrade an Oracle Application Server 10g Release 3 (10.1.3.1.0) Basic Installation, which does not include an instance of Oracle HTTP Server. In this situation, there are no components that can be upgraded automatically by the Oracle Fusion Middleware Upgrade Assistant.

B.2.3 Troubleshooting Database Connection Problems When Upgrading Schemas

If you have trouble connecting to a database when using the Upgrade Assistant to upgrade a component schema, try connecting to the database using another tool, such as SQL*Plus. This will help you troubleshoot the problem by verifying that the database is up and running and available on the network.

B.3 Examining the Log File

The Upgrade Assistant generates a set of log files that you can use to troubleshoot, verify, or analyze the upgrade process.

The Upgrade Assistant log file is located in the following directory; its name contains the date and time of the Upgrade Assistant session:

- On Windows systems:

`DESTINATION_ORACLE_HOME\upgrade\logs\`

- On UNIX systems:

`DESTINATION_ORACLE_HOME/upgrade/logs/`

B.4 Investigating Examination Failures

To determine the cause of an examination failure:

1. Note the name of the failed component in the OracleAS Upgrade Assistant dialog or command-line output.
2. Open the following Upgrade Assistant log file.
For the location of the log file, see [Section B.3, "Examining the Log File"](#).
3. In the log file, search for the message `Starting to examine component_name`.
4. Refer to the *Oracle Fusion Middleware Error Messages Reference* for information about specific error messages in the Upgrade log files.

B.5 Investigating Upgrade Failures

To determine the cause of an upgrade failure:

1. Note the name of the failed component in the OracleAS Upgrade Assistant dialog or command-line output.
2. Open the Upgrade log file:
For the location of the log file, see [Section B.3, "Examining the Log File"](#).
3. Search for the message `Starting to upgrade component_name`.
4. Refer to the *Oracle Fusion Middleware Error Messages Reference* for information about specific error messages in the Upgrade log files.

B.6 Restarting the Upgrade Assistant

When you are upgrading a middle tier, you can restart the Upgrade Assistant after it has partially or completely processed an Oracle home. Follow these steps:

1. Start the Upgrade Assistant in GUI or command-line mode.

The OracleAS Upgrade Assistant displays a message, which explains whether or not the previous upgrade was successful.

2. If the previous upgrade was not completed, close the dialog (GUI version) or enter Yes (command-line version) and continue with the upgrade.

B.7 Starting the Upgrade Assistant on UNIX Systems When Using Multiple Oracle Universal Installer Inventory Locations

On UNIX systems, the Oracle Universal Installer creates an inventory location file, `/etc/oraInst.loc`, when it installs Oracle products. This file contains the location (full path) of the Oracle Universal Installer directory, and the group name of the user who installed it.

The Upgrade Assistant locates valid source Oracle home locations with the information from this directory, the default inventory. Additional inventories files are sometimes created after installation so you can manage Oracle homes independently (thereby circumventing the Oracle Universal Installer features that track all Oracle homes in a single inventory).

If there are multiple inventory location files on the computer on which you are performing an upgrade, and you want to be able to select a non-default inventory location, you must start the Upgrade Assistant with the `-invPtrloc` argument, specifying the inventory location file(s) for the Oracle homes involved in the upgrade.

For example, if the Oracle Application Server 10g Oracle home and the Oracle Fusion Middleware 11g Oracle home are installed in different inventories, then you must specify both inventories on the Upgrade Assistant command line.

For complete information about the Oracle inventory, see the *Oracle Universal Installer and OPatch User's Guide* in the Oracle Database documentation library on Oracle Technology Network (OTN):
